# **Profiles In Success**

Stephen J. Cannell

Writer/producer

To most people Stephen J. Cannell looks like he has everything: fame, fortune and a close family life. However, the rise to the top was anything but a sure bet for the high school boy who flunked three grades because of his undiagnosed dyslexia and was told he would never realize his ambition of being a writer. With the inspiring words of a creative writing teacher, the support of his wife Marcia and the perseverance and dedication to a rigid work ethic that was to serve him so well in life, he spent 5 years honing his craft -- without selling a thing. But he was always confident that the opportunity would come. It came, and he was ready.

Stephen J. Cannell is the award-winning author of 12 novels and the creator/co-creator of over 40 television programs. Over his thirty-year career in Hollywood, he has scripted over 450 show episodes and has produced more than 1500 episodes. Some of his more well known television shows include *the Rockford Files, The A-Team,* and *21Jump Street.* 

Stephen J. Cannell was raised in Pasadena, California. His father ran an interior design firm. From an early age, Stephen suffered from undiagnosed dyslexia, which made it nearly impossible from him to do well in school--he either flunked or was held back many times. Even though one of the courses he had trouble with was English, he wrote in one of his yearbooks that it was his ambition to be an author.

Stephen Cannell is severely dyslexic. He has written about studying for hours for tests and still failing, and his frustration with his struggles. Cannell stated that he has problems dialing a telephone, spelling words, doesn't know his left from his right, and is a very slow reader. After a lot of work, he managed to graduate from high school and attend the University of Oregon. He worked for his father's design firm while he wrote television scripts and story ideas after work. Cannell was finally diagnosed at age 35 after his daughter, exhibiting many of his own habits, floundered in school and was tested for a learning disability.

Cannell had lived his whole life with his own academic failings despite his confidence in his own intelligence. Yet his dyslexia is also responsible for his career. Dyslexics often exhibit right brain abstract thought processes — visualizing words into a story. The writing process is all about utilizing this process. He began writing consistently and constantly during college, putting to paper his thoughts and his visions and not worrying about misspellings. He began writing for television in the late 1960's and won his first Emmy in 1978.

Cannell has stated that he fears dyslexic students will quit on themselves before they get out of school. He views his dyslexia as a gift, not a curse, as it is responsible for his outstanding and remarkable career. Cannell is a tireless spokesman fro dyslexia. # Four (4) lessons to make you think about the way we treat people

I recently received the following e-mail, like most of the "junk" ones I receive daily, I was about to delete it without reading and something said "Read me". Maybe it was the Christmas spirit maybe it was God giving me a wake up call for all my blessings.

Many times in our busy lives, we forget how important we are to others and how important others are to us. I sometimes have a "pity party" where I feel that no one cares what I do, how I do it or even if I do it. Sometimes while in this "blue funk" I run into a former student or a parent from the Foundation. During the conversation, they usually comment on what an impact the Foundation had on them. Then I start to think about the impact the Foundation has had on me and my family. I start to think about all those that worked so hard to help my children. I also think about all the support and strength they gave me when I need it. Then I ask myself these questions. 1st Did I thank them enough for all their hard work? 2nd Did I do enough for their child? Could I have given more of myself for all their support? 3rd I hope they found the bag of gold under the obstacle my children caused them. I know I have found many bags of gold during the years. 4th What kind of sacrifice did they have to make for my children? I know of some stories but many were never told but just endured while helping the children of the Foundation

As you read these stories, I hope you think about the Foundation and all the parents and children in it. We are a family! Remember them in your prayers. Thank them from time to time for all the hard work and sacrifices they make. Many friendships and relationships are started here that last a lifetime.

Thank you all for all your hard work, dedication and for the fond memories you have given me through the years. I hope, as you read the following lessons you will find them as thought provoking as I did.

### <u>1 - First Important Lesson - Cleaning Lady.</u>

During my second month of college, our professor gave us a pop quiz. I was a conscientious student and had breezed through the questions until I read the last one

"What is the first name of the woman who cleans the school?"

Surely this was some kind of joke. I had seen the cleaning woman several times. She was tall, dark-haired and in her 50s, but how would I know her name?

I handed in my paper, leaving the last question blank. Just before class ended, one student asked if the last question would count toward our quiz grade.

"Absolutely," said the professor. "In your careers, you will meet many people. All are significant. They deserve your attention and care, even if all you do is smile and say "hello."

I've never forgotten that lesson. I also learned her name was Dorothy.

### <u>2 - Second Important Lesson - Always remember those who</u> <u>serve.</u>

In the days when an ice cream sundae cost much less, a 10-year-old boy entered a hotel coffee shop and sat at a table. A waitress put a glass of water in front of him.

"How much is an ice cream sundae?" he asked.

"Fifty cents," replied the waitress.

The little boy pulled is hand out of his pocket and studied the coins in it.

"Well, how much is a plain dish of ice cream?" he inquired.

By now more people were waiting for a table and the waitress was growing impatient.

"Thirty-five cents," she brusquely replied.

The little boy again counted his coins.

"I'll have the plain ice cream," he said.

The waitress brought the ice cream, put the bill on the table and walked away. The boy finished the ice cream, paid the cashier and left. When the waitress came back, she began to cry as she wiped down the table. There, placed neatly beside the empty dish, were two nickels and five pennies.

### 3 - Third Important Lesson. - The obstacle in Our Path.

After much pushing and straining, he finally succeeded. After the peasant picked up his load of vegetables, he noticed a purse lying in the road where the boulder had been. The purse contained many gold coins and a note from the King indicating that the gold was for the person who removed the boulder from the roadway. The peasant learned what many of us never understand!

Every obstacle presents an opportunity to improve our condition.

#### 4 - Forth Important Lesson - Giving When it Counts ...

Many years ago, when I worked as a volunteer at a hospital, I got to know a little girl named Liz who was suffering from a rare & serious disease. Her only chance of recovery appeared to be a blood transfusion from her 5-year old brother, who had miraculously survived the same disease and had developed the antibodies needed to combat the illness. The doctor explained the situation to her little brother, and asked the little boy if he would be willing to give his blood to his sister.

I saw him hesitate for only a moment before taking a deep breath and saying, "Yes I'll do it if it will save her." As the transfusion progressed, he lay in bed next to his sister and smiled, as we all did, seeing the color returning to her cheek. Then his face grew pale and his smile faded.

He looked up at the doctor and asked with a trembling voice, "Will I start to die right away".

Being young, the little boy had misunderstood the doctor; he thought he was going to have to give his sister all of his blood in order to save her.

We are again planning a 12 week spring program. It will be conducted on Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The program will run from Saturday, January 26 to Saturday, April 26, 2007 at St. Benedict at Auburndale High School (SBA), 8250 Varnavas Dr., Cordova, TN 38016.

Workshop, which are <u>mandatory</u> for all personnel, will be held Saturday January 19, 2007, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at St. Benedict at Auburndale School **BRING A LUNCH!!!!** 

The Dyslexia Foundation's own language curriculum is used for instruction. Students MUST take part in the full curriculum for the entire 12 week period.

The following policies must be understood by all who apply to the program - - as tutors or students:

1. Only those who have been tested and recommended will be accepted as students. Please contact a Director if you have questions about being accepted.

2. Unexcused absences by anyone (students and/or personnel) can result in dismissal from the program and all future Foundation programs. Illness is the only acceptable reason for absence. Any other excuse must be cleared before the absence by the board.

3. All tutors must exceed sixteen years of age.

4. All participants must be current members of The Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis. Dues are \$20.00.

5. A certain dress code will be observed by everyone.

6. ALL WORKSHOPS ARE MANDATORY FOR ALL PERSONNEL.

7. All personnel must fulfill all obligations as set forth in the application contract.

Please apply for the subject you prefer to tutor, math or social values. New parent-tutors apply only for reading. The following areas require tutors:

- 1. Reading (All tutors tutor Language)
- 2. Math or Social Values

Workshops and daily staff meetings will provide instruction in the use of the materials. Supervision will be given over all areas of instruction.

<u>The tuition is \$180.00 with a \$25.00 registration fee for a total of \$205.00 per student.</u> The entire amount is due by the student's first Saturday unless other prior arrangements are made with the program directors. Fees cannot be refunded. Remember parents who are going to tutor must apply. The above figures require an enrollment of 40 students in order for the Foundation to offer the Fall Program at this tuition cost.

All applications must be returned <u>before January 12, 2008.</u> If you are unable to meet this deadline please call and notify the Director of your intentions. Neither students nor tutor applications will be accepted after that date unless verbal approval has been made. An exception will be made for new families who were tested during the Fall 2007 semester.
