

A Parent talks about the Foundation

Several months ago, Karen asked everyone to pen down what the Foundation means to them personally. Always the procrastinator, I have waited far too late, but here is my attempt to express how much the Foundation has affected my life.

First and foremost, I consider this organization to be a direct answer to heart-felt prayer to God for help. As a mother of three young children, I had undertaken the task of home-schooling our children at a time when few others were doing so. I was delighted to experience a good deal of success with the older two. They both learned what was required of them and seemed to enjoy learning. However, when I began to try to involve my youngest, Jon, in our classes, I met with a great deal of resistance. Concepts that had seemed simple for his brother and sister to understand were beyond his grasp. I knew from his interaction in activities outside the classroom, he had a bright mind; yet, grappling with symbols (letters and numbers) and concepts that require sequencing causing consternation. The more I tried to encourage him to learn, the more he resisted, shaking his head and saying, "This doesn't make any sense." I tried three different reading curriculums, but nothing seemed

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to open up his understanding.

By the time Jon was eight and still unable to read three-letter words, I was desperate. I had felt each child develops at his/her own rate and had given him every opportunity to develop personal interests, but it was evident that cousins younger than he were passing him academically. I knew something had to be done. I finally purposed that I would have to put the older two children in public school so I could devote all my time to helping Jon. Jennifer and Jeremy both easily passed placement tests and entered public school, each of them surpassing the requirements for their grade levels.

To be honest, I felt vindicated when we received the test scores. I had begun to worry that my failure with Jon was due to my own inadequacies as a teacher, but the scores of the older children put those fears to rest. Since the fault obviously wasn't mine, I reasoned that Jon must just not be trying hard enough. I renewed my efforts and spent long hours working with him individually; but after several months had to admit I hadn't made any more progress than before. I got on my knees in earnest and poured out my complaint before the Lord.

Later that week, I was in our local library to return some books. As I walked past a shelf, I noticed a book on display that caught my eye. The reason it caught my attention was because the title of the book was misspelled. The title was Can't Read, Can't Write, Can't Takl Too Good Either. I thought, "Who on earth would misspell the title of a book?" God knew my penchant for proof reading and I believe He had the librarian place the book at just the right location to catch my eye that day. I have a God that answers prayer! The book is the biography of a young man who was dyslexic. As I turned the pages, reading bits and pieces of the text, I thought, "This is Jon!"

Although I knew nothing about Dyslexia, I knew there must be someone who did. I went home and called the LINK line (library information services) and asked if there was anyone in the Memphis area that dealt with dyslexia. They referred me to the Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis. That was in 1988, and I have been with them ever since. Jon was tested by a lovely lady who informed me that Jon was truly very dyslexic, as well as dysgraphic. It took him 20 minutes to copy a paragraph on the test she gave him. Most of his writing was mirror writing. We found out about the Foundation's summer program that was about to start almost immediately. Praise the Lord, it was offered at no charge as long as I attended also. If there had been a monetary cost, I don't think we could have been able to attend, and Jon and I would have continued battling our heads against one another. I was more than happy to devote the necessary time to helping my child.

That summer program was an eye opener for me. I became familiar with the symptoms of dyslexia and began to see why Jon had such issues with reading and writing. I had to deal with a good deal of remorse for my past attitude towards him, finally realizing that he really couldn't help how he struggled. It also explained his difficulty with his speech; he had several issues with mispronouncing certain sounds: "th" for "s"; "w" for "r" specifically. It was a relief for him and for me also, to find there were plenty of other people that struggled with the same issues. The classes became as much a support group as educational instruction. For the first time, Jon made friends of his own. His learning differences had always made being with peers awkward for him.

We met some wonderful people at the Foundation that year who were patient and encouraging. I continued the program in the fall, working as an assistant to the supervisor, which helped cover tuition but also gave me more insight into the workings of the program. My first semester was the very first time the present curriculum had been implemented at the Foundation. I was able to witness, first hand, the growth of the foundation from the DPSL program to what we have now. God also allowed me the privilege of working closely with Miss Claire Worthington as she developed the new curriculum. Her knowledge of phonics and understanding of the dyslexic mind were instrumental in helping me develop the skills I have today.

Jon never finished the program, but he did learn to read and write. He also learned "how to learn", and finally graduated from high school and a trade school simultaneously. Coincidentally neither of his siblings completed

high school, opting to get GED's instead. Jon has gone on to become quite successful as an employee for Nike, Inc. the Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis has done far more than just train him. So far five of my 13 grandchildren have been students at the Foundation. Elysa managed to graduate from the entire program and has become a tutor, giving back what she gained. Cheyenne has gone on to enjoy school, and loves tutoring also. The others have all profited from the skills they learned at the Foundation.

Beyond that, the Foundation has given me my life's work. In high school, I never dreamed of being a teacher. Rather, I majored in business courses and worked for a number of years in credit departments of various corporations. Although I never lacked for work, it never offered the same sense of satisfaction that comes from seeing a child's face light up with understanding. I have found working with adult tutors just as rewarding. Helping them understand why our language works together like it does insures that someone else will be able to keep the work going. The Foundation has given me the opportunity to serve in many capacities: parent, tutor, assistant supervisor, co-director, board member, liaison for new parents, and testing coordinator. Perhaps the task closest to my heart has been that of editing the curriculum in light of the vision Claire Worthington had imparted to me. She wanted a curriculum that didn't just teach children to read, but taught them how to learn.

When I think of the Dyslexia Foundation, the one word that comes to my mind is "success". Christina Carson, Heather Banks, Lisa Pennington, and Lisa O'Neal successfully embody the vision that Miss Worthington had. They have gone beyond the pages of the curriculum to make learning their own; and despite the sacrifice of time and effort, they've come back to pass it on to others, utilizing their God-given talents in a way that benefits the next generation of dyslexics. Miss Worthington used to say, "God loves this Foundation." for the way it has taught me to accept, understand, and encourage others, I love it too.

Dear Parents and Tutors:

We are again planning a 12 week fall program. It will be conducted on Saturdays from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. The program will run from Saturday, January 23 to Saturday, April 23, 2016 at All Saints Episcopal Church, 1508 S White Station Rd., Memphis, TN 38117

Workshops, which are mandatory for all personnel, will be held Saturday January 16, 2016, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at All Saints Church BRING A LUNCH!!!!

The Dyslexia Foundation's own language curriculum is used for instruction. Students MUST take part in the full curriculum for the entire 12 week period.

The following policies must be understood by all who apply to the program - - as tutors or students:

1. Only those who have been recommended will be accepted as students. Please contact a Director if you have questions about being accepted.
2. All tutors must be sixteen years of age or older.
3. All participants must be current members of The Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis. Dues are \$20.00.
4. A certain dress code will be observed by everyone.
5. ALL WORKSHOPS ARE MANDATORY FOR ALL PERSONNEL.
6. All personnel must fulfill all obligations as set forth in the application contract.

Please apply for the subject you prefer to tutor, math or language. New parent-tutors apply only for reading.

The following areas require tutors:

1. Reading (All tutors tutor Language)
2. Math

Workshops and daily staff meetings will provide instruction in the use of the materials. Supervision will be given over all areas of instruction.

The tuition is \$200.00 per student plus a \$75.00 registration fee. The entire amount is due with the application before January 16, 2016. It cannot be refunded. Remember parents must tutor must fill out an application. The above figures require an enrollment of 60 students in order for the Foundation to offer the Fall Program at this tuition cost.

All applications must be returned before January 16, 2016. If you are unable to meet this deadline please call and notify the Director of your intentions. Neither students nor tutor applications will be accepted after that date unless verbal approval has been made. An exception will be made for new families who were tested during the fall 2015 semester.
