Summer Program Begins

Another Summer Program is getting close. I fear that our new parents don't know how important it is to attend a summer program. A summer program is 20 consecutive days (not counting weekends) of learning in the middle of the summer. Therefore the students learn, remember, and learn some more in a very concentrated manner. Whereas Saturday School is learn on Saturday morning then go to regular school for five days and forget; come back to Saturday School and reinforce the same thing again until they can put what they are learning into their long term memory. Summer School, because it is every day, is learn, remember, learn, learn, and learn some more. By the time regular school starts the students are so pumped up they start the school year with flying colors. Now let's talk price – If you, a relative, or a friend come and tutor for the full semester the only cost is a \$25.00 registration fee. If you must work, which is most of us, and have no one to send the cost is only \$575.00 which is still a bargain. Now look at how that breaks down; each day from 8:30am to 3:30pm = 7 hours a day for 20 days for a total of 140 hours of concentrated tutoring. Now, divide the 140 hours into \$575.00 and you come up with having you child tutored for \$4.10 an hour. Wow, What a bargain! Where else can you find quality tutoring for your child for \$4.10 per hour; you can't

Dear Parents,

Well another semester has ended – which always brings a little sadness and a lot of joy. Why sadness? Because I know “life will happen” and some of our students will not return. Here is the scenario. Their child is struggling in school, bad grades, low self-esteem, poor attitude and fighting with parents about homework, school and life in general. The parents find out about the Dyslexia Foundation's Programs and they are sold and start attending. All of a sudden, grades start improving; students start feeling better about themselves, less stress at home, etc. Now the parents think “hallelujah” my child is cured and they leave the foundation. This euphoria last for several months and sometimes even years but slowly all the problems return. But, for some unknown reason, the parents choose not to return. It could be the money. a little more peace and quiet at home I am not sure that is the reason. More often than not though it is time and life that gets in the way; work, home and chores around the house, sports and just I need a day off. Dear Parents and Tutors:

We are again planning a 4 week summer program. It will be conducted week days from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The program will run Monday June 18, 2012 to Friday, July 13, 2012 at St. Benedict at Auburndale High School (SBA), 8250 Varnavas Dr., Cordova, TN 38016.

Workshops, which are mandatory for all personnel, will be held on June 14 & 15, 2012, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at St. Benedict at Auburndale School BRING A LUNCH!!!!

The Dyslexia Foundation's own language curriculum is used for instruction. Students MUST take part in the full curriculum for the entire 4 week period.

The following policies must be understood by all who apply to the program - - as tutors or students:

1. Only those who have been tested and recommended will be accepted as students. Please contact a Director if you have questions about being accepted. **Exceptions can be made.**
2. Unexcused absences by anyone (students and/or personnel) can result in dismissal from the program and all future Foundation programs. Illness is the only acceptable reason for absence. Any other excuse must be cleared before the absence by the board.
3. All tutors must exceed sixteen years of age.
4. All participants must be current members of The Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis. Dues are \$20.00.
5. A certain dress code will be observed by everyone.
6. **ALL WORKSHOPS ARE MANDATORY FOR ALL PERSONNEL.**
7. All personnel must fulfill all obligations as set forth in the application contract.

Please apply for the subject you prefer to tutor, math or social values. New parent-tutors apply only for reading. The following areas require tutors:

1. Reading
2. Math

Workshops and daily staff meetings will provide instruction in the use of the materials. Supervision will be given over all areas of instruction.

The tuition will be \$550.00 per student plus a \$25.00 Registration fee per student. The entire amount is due with the application before June 14, 2012. It cannot be refunded. Remember parents who are going to tutor must apply. The above figures require an enrollment of 60 students in order for the Foundation to offer the Summer Program at this tuition cost.

All applications must be returned before June 14, 2012. If you are unable to meet this deadline please call and notify the Director of your intentions. Neither students nor tutor applications will be accepted after that date unless verbal approval has been made.
