In 2008 a very bright dyslexic girl started regular school. Her family was full of hope for this bright young girl to do well. But instead, she struggled in reading, spelling, and writing. Her parents looked around for help and by God's good grace, found our Dyslexia Foundation. After a few months at the Foundation they began to see Auburn's ability to learn in all subjects improve. Her self-esteem increased, her ability to think and learn independently grew. Her attitude, "I can do this" also grew. Her grades went from B's and C's to A's and high B's. After a few years her A's were rewarded with placement into honors classes. And, although she was doing great in school, she stayed in the Foundation working her way through our curriculum each Saturday and during the month-long program each summer for 8 years. In 2018, she was inducted into the National Honor Society, the National Mathematics Honor Society, and all her classes where Honors classes. This summer she has been invited to attend a National Student Leadership Conference at Northwestern University in Chicago.

I am pleased to report that during her 8 years at the Dyslexia Foundation she completed all 9 books of our program and I had the honor to present Auburn with a Certificate of Graduation from our program. In the fall she plans to return to the Foundation to tutor our students.

NOW THIS IS A TEACHER!

While editing the newsletter over Memorial weekend I came across this article on the web. I did a little research and found this is a true story.

Please read and remember all the veterans who have served and are currently serving to allow us the freedoms, including education, we enjoy and often take for granted as something that is owed us; not something

that many gave their lives to give to us.

In September of 2005, on the first day of school, Martha Cothren, a History teacher at Robinson High School in Little Rock, did something not to be forgotten. On the first day of school, with the permission of the school superintendent, the principal and the building supervisor, she removed all of the desks in her classroom.

When the first period kids entered the room, they discovered that there were no desks.

'Ms. Cothren, where are our desks?'

She replied, 'You can't have a desk until you tell me how you earn the right to sit at a desk.'

They thought, 'Well, maybe it's our grades' 'No,' she said. 'Maybe it's our behavior.' She told them, 'No, it's not even your behavior.'

And so, they came and went, the first period, second period, third period. Still no desks in the classroom. Kids called their parents to tell them what was happening and by early afternoon television news crews had started gathering at the school to report about this crazy teacher who had taken all the desks out of her room.

The final period of the day came and as the puzzled students found seats on the floor of the desk-less classroom. Martha Cothren said, 'Throughout the day, no one has been able to tell me just what he or she has done to earn the right to sit at the desks that are ordinarily found in this classroom. Now I am going to tell you.'

At this point, Martha Cothren went over to the door of her classroom and opened it. Twenty-seven (27) U.S. Veterans, all in uniform, walked into that classroom, each one carrying a school desk. The Vets began placing the school desks in rows, and then they would walk over and stand alongside the wall. By the time the last soldier had set the final desk in place those kids started to understand, perhaps for the first time in their lives, just how the right to sit at those desks had been earned.

Martha said, 'You didn't earn the right to sit at these desks. These heroes did it for you. They placed the desks here for you. They went halfway around the world, giving up their education and interrupting their careers and families so you could have the freedom you have. Now, it's up to you to sit in them. It is your responsibility to learn, to be good students, to be good citizens. They paid the price so that you could have the freedom to get an education. Don't ever forget it.'

By the way, this is a true story. And this teacher was awarded the Veterans of Foreign Wars Teacher of the Year for the State of Arkansas in 2006. She is the daughter of a WWII POW.

Let us always remember the men and women of our military and the rights they have won for us.

Hard Work Pays Off



Victoria Wakefield, a former student at the Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis, found the program to be rewarding and life changing. As a child, Victoria learned that

academic success would be a matter of hard work and diligence. She relied on teachers and after school programs to provide her with homework support. While working with Mrs. Carson and the dedicated tutors at the Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis, she discovered techniques to improve fluency through a non-traditional learning program.

The Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis provided a one on one mentorship program specializing in the development of language and learning skills. Her transformation as a student was attributed to her ability to see and process things differently. Reading and other skills were difficult to acquire, but not a barrier to success. The program not only taught her the valuable learning techniques, but also gave her the self-confidence to pursue her passion as an Early Childhood educator. With the support of her sisters, family, and friends, Victoria will continue to achieve academic success and help raise awareness about dyslexia in the community. db qp

Kathleen Lehigh: a Ninja Librarian's Quest for a Career by Patti Lehigh, TN Partners in Policymaking™ Leadership Institute graduate and Kathleen's mom



Kathleen Lehigh of Cordova, Tennessee has the super powers of cerebral palsy and dyslexia. She graduated from Concord Academy High School in Memphis. Her goal was always to be a librarian (secretly a Ninja Librarian), and she knew that her main objective was to get a Library and Information Science (LIS) Degree from the University of Southern Mississippi (USM).

Kathleen completed her basic classes at a community college in Memphis. At the same time she interned as a librarian at the Catholic Diocese of Memphis Library and competed for the Mid-South Adaptive Sports and Recreation Group to represent Tennessee at regional levels in track and field.

Kathleen started her core undergraduate classes online with USM's LIS Department. At the same time she worked internships for the Memphis Public Library and

Information Center (MPLIC) in the Archive Department and then at the Help Desk. For Kathleen's last year of undergraduate school she moved to the USM campus in Hattiesburg, MS.

The whole time she never wavered from her mission - just like a Ninja!

Kathleen used her walker and her scooter for access around campus. She interviewed and hired a Personal Care Assistant (PCA). She made friends and introduced people to her different abilities. The campus police provided her rides to class during rainstorms so she wouldn't ruin her scooter. She involved her instructors and friends in meeting her accommodation needs. The Office of Disabilities and Accommodations and the Office of Housing and Residency at USM were phenomenal in their service. Kathleen realized she was responsible for asking for help and being specific about what was needed - if she was going to succeed.

She completed her BA in Library and Information Science with Highest Honors in Fall 2014, and after consulting with interested representatives of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, she knew, in order to reach her dreams, she had to work a bit more. Kathleen started the Master's program Spring 2015.

Kathleen learned that balance is key. She worked her life around church, school, exercise and her mental health. Kathleen knows that when she is so busy with life and her "super powers," asking for help with anxiety and depression is one of the most important things to do! She utilized the campus fitness center because exercise also helped her mental health. She developed a routine including yoga, modified ballet and working with a personal trainer.

Kathleen completed her Master's Degree in Library and Information Science and a Certificate in Special Collections and Archives in May 2018.

Kathleen is actively seeking a position that matches her skills, her interests and her Ninja attitude. She is also trying to complete a yoga teaching certificate, as a back-up plan or to supplement her library work. She wishes to remain in the South, but if the FBI needs her, she might see what she can do to accommodate them!

Kellcy started out terrified of school hiding under her desk because she was afraid of the words on the page. She now wants to join the National Honor Society. She has had serious health problems all her life, often only able to attend school a few days each week. Yet, she ranks 67th in her class. She is taking pre-AP classes in Algebra and Biology. Her grandmother helps her at home since her health often keeps her out of school.

Next year, in the 11th grade Michael will have pre-AP classes & 2 college classes and Kellcy will be taking pre-AP Calculus, Anatomy and Physiology. Their mother, Lisa, says this helps prove Saturday School works. "It takes patience and consistency. Our girls would not be the success they are today without Saturday School. Michael makes all A's and Kellcy makes A's and B's. Stay with the program and it will stay with you! It does work!" Their mother knows from her own childhood because she also attended Saturday School and is now a very successful realtor in Arkansas. She is in the top 10% of realtors in the state.

Dear Parents and Tutors:

We are again planning a 4 week summer program. It will be conducted week days from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The program will run Monday, June 17, 2019, to Friday, July 12, 2019, at **All Saints' Episcopal Church**, 1508 S. White Station Rd. Memphis, TN 38117.

Workshops, which are *mandatory* for all personnel, will be held on June 13 & 14, 2018, from 8:30 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. at All Saints Episcopal Church BRING A LUNCH!!!!

The Dyslexia Foundation's own language curriculum is used for instruction. Students MUST take part in the full curriculum for the entire 4 week period, exceptions can be made by speaking with a Director...

The following policies must be understood by all who apply to the program as tutors or students:

1. Students who have been recommended for the program as well as those who are having trouble in school are welcome. Please contact a Director if you have questions about being accepted. **Exceptions can be made.** We will try to help anyone with a reading or math problem.

2. All tutors must be sixteen years of age or older.

3. All participants must be current members of The Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis. Dues are \$20.00.

4. A certain dress code will be observed by everyone.

5. ALL WORKSHOPS ARE MANDATORY FOR ALL PERSONNEL.

6. All personnel must fulfill all obligations as set forth in the application contract.

Please apply for the subject you prefer to tutor: math or language. New parent-tutors apply only for language. The following areas require tutors:

1. Language

2. Math

Workshops and daily staff meetings will provide instruction in the use of the materials. Supervision will be given over all areas of instruction.

The tuition will be \$600.00 per student plus a \$75.00 Registration fee per student. The entire amount is due with the application before June 13, 2019. It cannot be refunded. Remember if you tutor, the tuition is waved and the cost for summer is only the \$75.00 registration fee. Parents who are planning to tutor must fill out a tutor application and return it by June 13, 2019. Everyone needs to pay dues each year.

All applications must be returned before June 13, 2019. If you are unable to meet this deadline please call and notify the Director of your intentions. Neither students nor tutor applications will be accepted after that date unless verbal approval has been made before the deadline. An exception will be made for new families who were tested during the Spring 2019 semester.
