We kept up the hard work with little to show for our efforts. As my son grew older, it was time for the fear of the big "K"; yes, starting Kindergarten. Would he fit in? Would his teacher be patient? Could they do what I failed to do? Would they tell me he was a slow learner? The first three or four weeks seemed to be going smoothly, then the letter addressed

Beginning January 2005 we began participating in Saturday School driving back and forth from our home in Columbus, Mississippi. It is a three-hour drive. We would leave from home

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

at 5:15am to arrive at St. Francis of Assisi Catholic School by 8:15am, but it was more than worth it! As you know, the program is made up of wonderful caring people who are there for the kids. It has helped us as parents better know how to help our son, plus it has boosted Phillip's self-esteem so much!

Last summer I was talking with a friend of mine who also has a son that is dyslexic and she said, "Becky, we shouldn't have to drive to Memphis to help our kids. Do you think we could get a program started here?" That was the push my husband, Steve, and I needed to begin the process. We developed a proposal and presented it to the Foundation's board. They approved our proposal and have given us the guidance we need to be successful.

Because of the support from the Foundation in Memphis, we were able to start the Golden Triangle Dyslexia Foundation in Columbus, Mississippi. The Carsons, Linda Lewis, The Futrells, and Mikelle Perry all came down to Columbus to meet with our new parents! The Carsons even came down one icy weekend to help us with training and continue to guide us through the process! We are using Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis "Saturday School" curriculum for Language, and Creative Writing to provide Saturday morning instruction to children in our area with dyslexia, reading difficulty, or related learning differences. Next semester, we hope to add Math or Auditory. Our mission is to teach these children in the same positive, caring environment that the Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis is known for. We also want to become a resource for the community, through outreach to teachers and parents, so that there will be increased community understanding of individuals with these learning differences.

Our first day was Saturday, February 11, 2006. We have 10 children enrolled, ages 7 to 12. Their parents are very motivated, and determined to make our program the success that the Memphis program is. The parents are already planning what we can do this summer!!

A couple of weeks ago, a child in our group stopped me. "Mrs. Barlow," he said. "I want to thank you for having this school here. I used to think I was stupid and the only one who couldn't read, but now I know I'm not, and I am learning how to read." His tutor and I looked at each other dumbfounded! I thanked him, and promptly went out into the hallway and cried!! That was a moment I will never, ever forget!

The only down side to starting a group in Columbus is that we miss you all very much. There were many times that we would arrive on Saturday morning, rumped and road weary, but when we would hear Mrs. Futrell's cheery "Good morning!", chant the CVC rule with Mrs. Pennington, or experience that "Ah-Ha!" moment when tutoring a child it made it all worth the trip!

Steve, the kids, and I will be up for the auction in April, and we are planning to come up for Summer School, too. Anytime you want to come visit we would love to have you. We also have a web-site up and running <http://gtdyslexia.org/>

to the parents of came, I opened the letter with a lump in my throat. The letter said, "I would like to have a conference with you and your husband." We had our meeting with the teacher; she was very young and I immediately felt uneasy. She proceeded to tell us she had been working with our son and noticed a pattern. She also explained that she was from Canada where she had done training in special education while finishing her degree. She said to watch him and continue working with him, if next year within the first two or three weeks of first grade he continues to do the same things, we should have him tested for Dyslexia. We did as she suggested. The first few weeks of first grade were terrible. We noticed him continuing to print his complete name backwards perfectly, reversing numbers, not following directions, not focusing, and the list kept growing. The first grade teacher told us that our son is not a slow learner but that he is lazy and wants to do his own thing. She told us that this was a normal stage that all children go through and he would grow out of it. She told us he didn't need to be tested. The next year, second grade, the same list occurred plus each year was worse than the last. Finally, we decided to have him tested. The Dr.'s office called with the results. They diagnosed him with Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder and Dyslexia. They also told us he had a vision problem and recommended we take him to a child optometrist. Still harboring a glimmer of hope that they were wrong, we did just as they said. Again we were told the same old story that our child has Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder and Dyslexia. I was devastated and did not know where to turn. As I tried to compose myself the doctor said he could give us help in finding support for our family. The doctor gave us a phone number for the Dyslexia foundation of Memphis. I called the following Monday and was invited to attend a parents meeting where they would have more information.

I attended the meeting feeling scared and very alone. I thought I was the only one with a child who could not learn. When I entered the large room, many people were seated all around waiting for the speaker to begin. When it was over I felt so relieved to know that there were other parents and children going through the same struggles as we were. I learned of a place called Saturday School. We immediately signed up for this program. My son is now seven years old and is going to school six days a week instead of five. I got a lot of flack from friends and family. Why was I being so cruel to our son? He will grow out of this stage he just needs to be a child and do all the things they do. You just need to tan his behind and he will do his school work. Well, its not true. Tanning his behind didn't help him with school and Dyslexia is not a stage. Dyslexia is a real learning disability that cannot be cured or punished out of a child. However, you can get help coping with the everyday struggles that you and your child face.

I am not saying it will be easy because it won't be, it will be harder than you can imagine, but will be so rewarding. After eleven and a half years of Saturday School we finally finished all the books from A-I. We were finally ready to graduate from the program. We had already graduated from real school. We had learned a lot of ways to compensate for our disability and found out we were also special. I also learned that not only did my son have Dyslexia, but I did as well. We found that there were people at Saturday School who understood, cared, and accepted us with open arms. I didn't have enough time to tell you all the things I wanted to tell, but God wanted me to share my story with others who may be where I was sixteen years ago. I have been a tutor and now am a supervisor at Saturday School. I have heard many parents come through our program saying they were at the end of their rope. I wanted to say this to all of them and to you-, come to Saturday School and you will soon learn it's a safe place for you and your child. They will receive positive reinforcement and they will find that it is okay to be different. Also, you as a parent, sister, brother, aunt, uncle, niece, nephew, grandparent, neighbor, or just someone who wants to make a difference will soon realize this is where you and your child belong.

I want to take this time to thank everyone from the top to the bottom of the foundation. You have made a great difference in my life and my child's life. You also made my friends and family members realize we did the right thing by going to Saturday School all these years and God willing we will continue to be a part of this wonderful organization. I hope I have made a small light shine on your dark corner of the world.

Helpful Tips for the LD

Here are some tips about how to help a child with learning disabilities reach their potential:

- Help them become the best self advocate that they can be. It is essential that parents make sure their child fully understands and can talk about his or her learning disability.
- Help them develop a "community of support" that includes their teachers, other role model adults and your child's friends. Having this support will allow them to more confidently navigate the areas where they face challenges.

Help them to learn how to be proactive. By helping them to find their passion and begin to create opportunities for themselves, they will start to thrive and become successful.

Who's Packing Your Parachute?

Charles Plumb was a US Navy jet pilot in Vietnam. After 75 combat missions, his plane was destroyed by a surface-to-air missile. Plumb ejected and parachuted into enemy hands. He was captured and spent 6 years in a communist Vietnamese prison. He survived the ordeal and now lectures on lessons learned from that experience!

One day, when Plumb and his wife were sitting in a restaurant, a man at another table came up and said, "You're Plumb! You flew jet fighters in Vietnam from the aircraft carrier Kitty Hawk. You were shot down!"

"How in the world did you know that?" asked Plumb.

"I packed your parachute," the man replied. Plumb gasped in surprise and gratitude. The man pumped his hand and said, "I guess it worked" Plumb assured him, "It sure did. If your chute hadn't worked, I wouldn't be here today."

Plumb couldn't sleep that night, thinking about that man. Plumb

says, "I kept wondering what he had looked like in a Navy uniform: a white hat; a bib in the back; and bell-bottom trousers. I wonder how many times I might have seen him and not even said 'Good morning, how are you?' or anything because, you see, I was a fighter pilot and he was just a sailor." Plumb thought of the many hours the sailor had spent at a long wooden table in the bowels of the ship, carefully weaving the shrouds and folding the silks of each chute, holding in his hands each time the fate of someone he didn't know.

Now, Plumb asks his audience, "Who's packing your parachute?" Everyone has someone who provides what they need to make it through the day. He also points out that he needed many kinds of parachutes when his plane was shot down over enemy territory -- he needed his physical parachute, his mental parachute, his emotional parachute, and his spiritual parachute. He called on all these supports before reaching safety.

Sometimes in the daily challenges that life gives us, we miss what is really important. We may fail to say hello, please, or thank you, congratulate someone on something wonderful that has happened to them, give a compliment, or just do something nice for no reason. As you go through this week, this month, this year, recognize people who pack your parachutes.

Someone sent this via e mail and I thought it was very appropriate for our children. I thought I would pass it along. So many of our children feel like "prisoners" of the school system. They need the parachute you help pack for them. Without your dedication to your tutoring job they might not survive the education ordeal. This as my way of thanking you for your part in helping to pack our student's parachute each time you work with them at the foundation. And I hope you will pass this on to those who have helped pack yours and your children's parachutes! - Cain

Dear Parents and Tutors:

We are again planning a 4 week summer program. It will be conducted week days from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. The program will run Monday June 19, 2006 to Friday, July 14, 2006 at St. Benedict at Auburndale High School (SBA), 8250 Varnavas Dr., Cordova, TN 38016.

Workshops, which are mandatory for all personnel, will be held on June 15 & 16, 2006, from 8:30 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. at St. Francis of Assisi School BRING A LUNCH!!!!

The Dyslexia Foundation's own language curriculum is used for instruction. Students MUST take part in the full curriculum for the entire 4 week period.

The following policies must be understood by all who apply to the program - - as tutors or students:

1. Only those who have been tested and recommended will be accepted as students. Please contact a Director if you have questions about being accepted.
2. Unexcused absences by anyone (students and/or personnel) can result in dismissal from the program and all future Foundation programs. Illness is the only acceptable reason for absence. Any other excuse must be cleared before the absence by the board.
3. All tutors must exceed sixteen years of age.
4. All participants must be current members of The Dyslexia Foundation of Memphis. Dues are \$15.00.
5. A certain dress code will be observed by everyone.
6. ALL WORKSHOPS ARE MANDATORY FOR ALL PERSONNEL.
7. All personnel must fulfill all obligations as set forth in the application contract.

Please apply for the subject you prefer to tutor, math or social values. New parent-tutors apply only for reading. The following areas require tutors:

1. Reading
2. Math

Workshops and daily staff meetings will provide instruction in the use of the materials. Supervision will be given over all areas of instruction.

The tuition will be \$550.00 per student. The entire amount is due with the application before June 10, 2006. It cannot be refunded. Remember parents who are going to tutor must apply. The above figures require an enrollment of 60 students in order for the Foundation to offer the Summer Program at this tuition cost.

All applications must be returned before June 10, 2006. If you are unable to meet this deadline please call and notify the Director of your intentions. Neither students nor tutor applications will be accepted after that date unless verbal approval has been made. An exception will be made for new families who were tested during the Spring 2006 semester.
